SPCR has launched a new PPIE funding call to provide researchers with funds to explore and develop new relationships with groups, organisations and communities currently under-served by research or health and care in general.

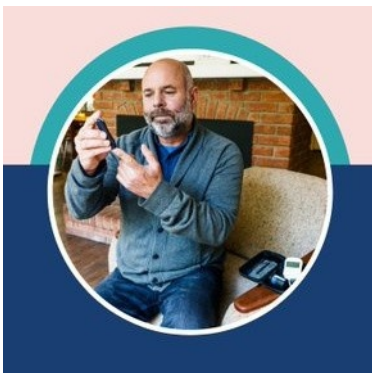


SPCR Elizabeth Murray Fellowship

NIHR Alert: Diabetes remission linked to lower risk of heart attack and stroke

Researchers assessed whether diabetes remission, even for a short period, reduces people's long-term risk of cardiovascular disease. The study shows that remission is linked with a lower risk of cardiovascular complications. This should reassure people with type 2 diabetes and clinicians that achieving remission is possible and has long-term health benefits.

The Stoma Support Study

The SPCR Stoma Support Study was recently carried out at Keele University. The study, led by Dr Benjamin Saunders, built on previous qualitative research in which the Keele team found that young people, aged 16-35, with inflammatory bowel disease (IBD) and who have stoma surgery, commonly experience emotional distress that is often not identified and/or not well-managed in clinical settings.

Round 4 of the NIHR Pre-doctoral Local Authority Fellowship (PLAF) scheme is now open for applications. The NIHR Pre-doctoral Local Authority Fellowship (PLAF) scheme supports individuals based within local authorities and supporting services to undertake a bespoke programme of relevant Masters level training and prepare an application for a subsequent PhD, all on their existing employment contracts and salaries. When taken full-time, standard fellowships have a duration of 12 months, but can also be taken part-time or over a shorter duration. Closes: **28 March 2024**

The IPF offers academic training to fully qualified General Practitioners, General Dental Practitioners and Community Dentists, who are in NHS practice in England.
