The project aims to identify and understand within primary care, the wellbeing and mental health needs of family carers of people living with dementia from a South Asian background in relation to their religion and culture. The project will also explore the facilitators, and barriers to accessing carer support within primary care and identify how support can be improved and developed to better support South Asian family carers. This project focuses specifically on the Pakistani and Bangladeshi community.

This project offers a great opportunity for you to develop your research skills by working alongside academic GPs and experienced researchers who apply psychology, sociology, and epidemiology to improving health inequalities. Your main role within this project is to become embedded in the qualitative study and discover how using these methods can be implied scientifically to improve the health and inequalities of disadvantaged groups.
