This series highlights the impact of continued SPCR research capacity and development funding since its introduction in 2010.

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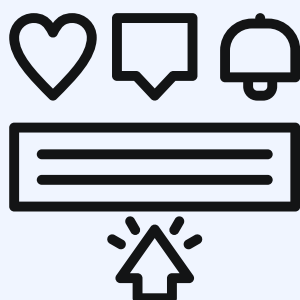
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NIHR Three Schools' Updates:

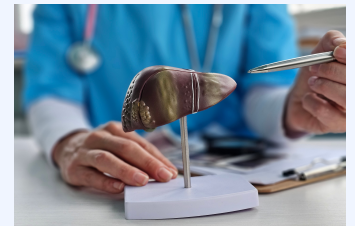

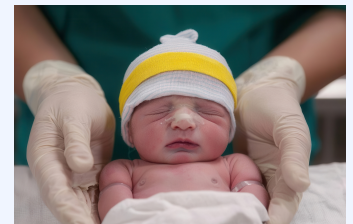
